Dedication

In loving memory of Jordan River Anderson, whose legacy is one of justice, dignity, and love. Though his life was short, he left behind a powerful gift for First Nations children, youth, and families: Jordan's Principle. **Jordan's Principle is a child-first principle and legal rule ensuring First Nations children get the services they need, when they need them.**

Jordan's legacy lives on in all of us who stand up for First Nations children. Jordan's Principle is a forever sacred responsibility that reminds us that **children must come first.**



About Jordan's Principle and This Scrapbook

Jordan River Anderson was a young boy from Norway House Cree Nation in Manitoba who was born in 1999 with multiple disabilities. For over two years, he lived in a children's hospital in Winnipeg because the federal government and provincial government of Manitoba could not agree on who would pay for his at-home care. The disagreement took place because federal and provincial/territorial governments often cannot agree on

who should pay for services for First Nations children, even when the service is normally available to other children. The result is that First Nations children are left waiting while governments argue about payment. Unfortunately, Jordan died in the hospital at the age of five, before he could experience living in a family home.

In 2005, Jordan's family and community bestowed a great honour and responsibility on all of us by allowing his name to be used for Jordan's Principle. Jordan's Principle was named in the 2005 report *Wen:de: We Are Coming to the Light of Day*, which exposed the deep systemic barriers preventing First Nations children from accessing needed services and supports. In response to advocacy from Jordan's family, community, and other First Nations and supporters, the House of Commons unanimously passed a motion in 2007 supporting Jordan's Principle.

Despite the unanimous support from all Members of Parliament, Canada chose not to properly implement Jordan's Principle, and First Nations children continued to be denied services due to Canada's excessively narrow and restrictive interpretation. In 2016, the Canadian Human Rights Tribunal (Tribunal) issued a landmark ruling, finding that Canada is discriminating against First Nations children in its provision of services. The Tribunal ordered Canada to stop the discrimination and prevent it from happening again. Yet, despite close to 30 legal orders since then, Canada has still not implemented Jordan's Principle according to the Tribunal's orders.

Full implementation of Jordan's Principle is both a legal obligation and a requirement for reconciliation. Jordan's Principle is one of the top Truth and Reconciliation Commission Calls to Action (Call to Action #3) and is echoed in the National Inquiry into Missing and Murdered Indigenous Women and Girls

Calls for Justice (Call 3.2). These calls emphasize that equitable access to health, education, and social services is foundational to reconciliation and justice for Indigenous peoples in Canada.

In 2025, we celebrate the 20th anniversary of Jordan's Principle. While some progress has been made, and Jordan's Principle has been life-changing and life-saving for thousands of First Nations children, much more needs to be done to end the federal government's discrimination in implementing Jordan's Principle. In honour of the 20th anniversary of Jordan's Principle, people across Canada came together to stand up for the rights of First Nations children and make this Bear Witness Day the most *bear*-rific yet. Celebrated annually on May 10, Bear Witness Day honours Jordan River Anderson and his family for the gift of Jordan's Principle and invites people of all ages to "bear witness" to ensure Jordan's Principle is fully implemented! Teddy bears were Jordan's favourite toy.



This scrapbook highlights some of the many events that were held in May 2025 to honour the tremendous impact of Jordan River Anderson's life and legacy. The largest events took place in Winnipeg, Manitoba, and Ottawa, Ontario. Both are significant locations related to Jordan's Principle.

In Winnipeg, Sagkeeng Child and Family Services and Kinosaosipi Minisowin Agency hosted a Bear Witness Day parade with Jordan's family as honoured guests. Premier Wab Kinew delivered a statement in Cree in the Manitoba legislature honouring Jordan, his family, and Jordan's Principle.

In Ottawa, across the street from the House of Commons, where Jordan's Principle was passed unanimously by Members of Parliament in 2007,

Senators Francis, Audette, Greenwood, Harder, Klyne, and White joined with the Assembly of Seven Generations and the Caring Society to host a Bear Witness Day celebration for elementary and high-school students at the Senate of Canada. The thoughtful letters and beautiful drawings created by these students can be found throughout this scrapbook.

The final section of the scrapbook highlights some of the many uplifting and impactful celebrations that took place from coast to coast to coast.

As we look back on 20 years of Jordan's Principle, and commit to ensuring its full and proper implementation by Canada, may this scrapbook serve as a reminder and gesture to honour the tremendous impact of Jordan River Anderson's life and legacy.

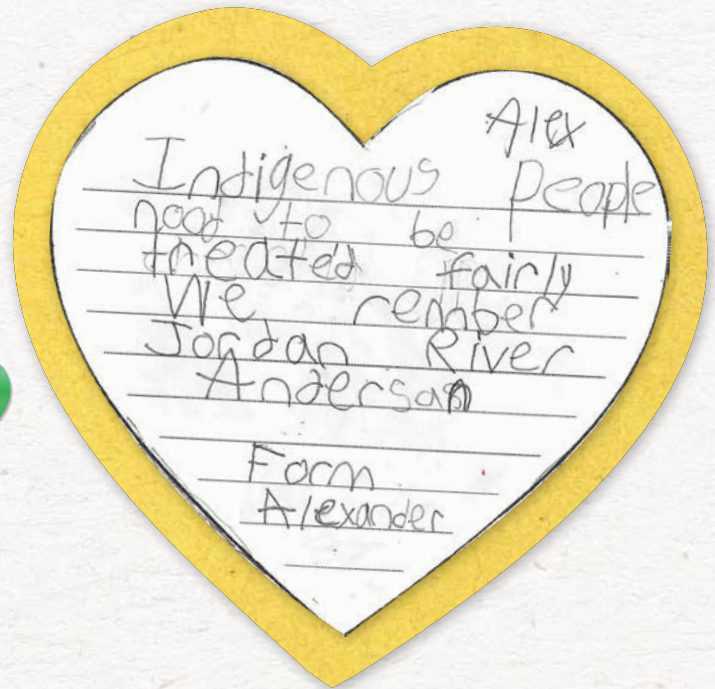

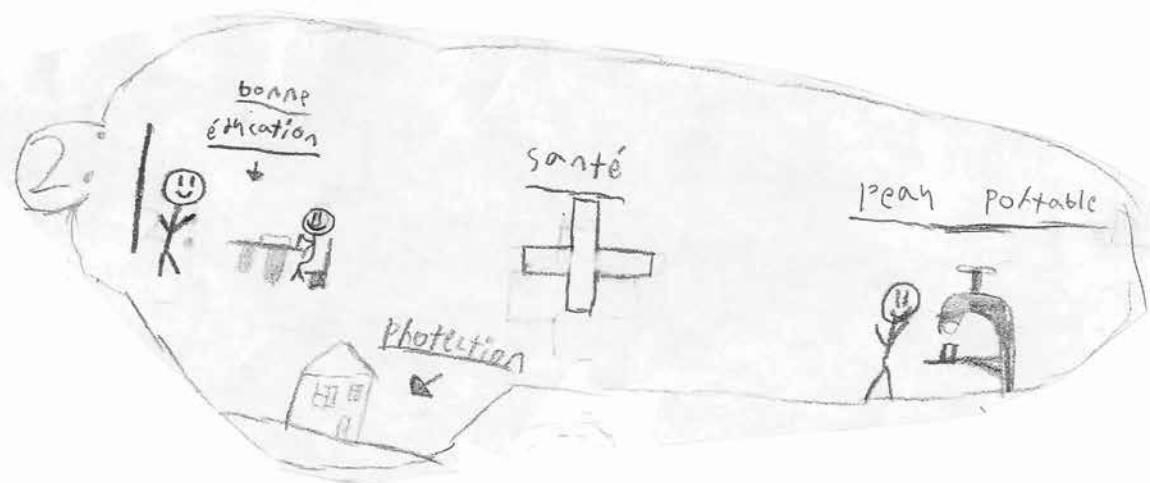

Bear Witness Day in Winnipeg

Principle. Jordan River Anderson's family collaborated on the day's events and were honoured guests. Youth leader Angel led children, families, and supporters on a

march from The Forks to Memorial Park, which is across from the Manitoba Legislature. At the park, young people and leaders spoke to the crowd and enjoyed lunch and an afternoon full of fun activities.

On May 8, Premier Wab Kinew delivered a statement in the Manitoba Legislature in Cree. He honoured Jordan River Anderson, Jordan's family, and Jordan's Principle. The statement also reflected on The Spirit Bear Day Act, which was passed by the Manitoba legislative assembly in 2018 to honour Jordan's memory and annually recognize the importance of Jordan's Principle on May 10.

Premier Wab Kinew's Speech, translated to English

Honourable Speaker, today, I rise to recognize May 10th as Bear Witness Day, also known in Manitoba as Spirit Bear Day – a day to honour the memory of Jordan River Anderson and to raise awareness about children's rights and the importance of Jordan's Principle.

Jordan was a young boy from Norway House Cree Nation born with complex medical needs who spent his entire life in hospital because governments could not agree on who should pay for his in-home healthcare costs. Those delays meant Jordan was never able to be at home, surrounded by family and his community; instead, he lived his short life in hospital. After his passing, Jordan's Principle was established to ensure that First Nations children receive the services they need and do not face gaps, delays or denials, caused by jurisdictional disputes.

This day reminds us that Jordan's Principle is more than a policy—it is a powerful expression of children's inherent human rights. It ensures that First Nations children receive the services and supports they need without delay and without being caught in jurisdictional disputes between governments.

At its core, Jordan's Principle affirms that no child should suffer or be left behind because of systemic inequalities. It is a tool of justice, designed to uphold the dignity, health, and wellbeing of children by placing their needs first – always.

Honouring Jordan's Principle and the memory of Jordan River Anderson means confronting the legacy of colonialism and working actively to ensure fairness and equity for First Nations kids who deserve nothing less than the full protection of their rights.

Honourable Speaker, as we mark the 20th anniversary of his passing, we honour Jordan's memory, and we recommit ourselves to treat every child with dignity, fairness, and compassion.

We recognize the strength and advocacy of Jordan's family, who pushed for needed changes within public health systems and who fought to ensure that no other family would have to endure the same injustice. Thank you for gifting all of us with Jordan's story and his name as a call to action so we can walk in a good way.

And, finally, we also acknowledge Dr. Cindy Blackstock for her work to ensure Jordan's experiences show us how to make things better for First Nations children. Dr. Blackstock's leadership across Canada has helped turn a principle into real action for thousands of children.

Jordan, we honour you.

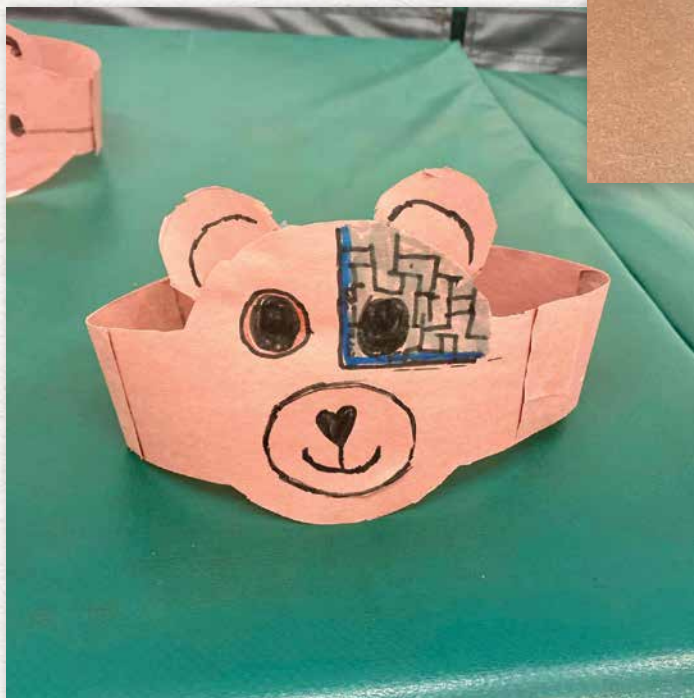


Bear Witness Day from Coast to Coast to Coast
