

This month we celebrate the birthday of a very special boy. Jordan River Anderson was a young First Nations boy from Norway House Cree Nation in Manitoba, born on October 22, 1999.

Halloween

He was born with multiple disabilities and lived his entire life in a hospital because federal and provincial governments could not agree on who would pay for his at-home care because he was a First Nations child who would normally live in his First Nations community (reserve). Sadly, Jordan died at the age of 5 before he could experience living in a loving home. Jordan's passing is what led to a movement called Jordan's Principle


